Nordic TD Forum - 2009 Conference

Evaluation Report¹

Friday 20st and Saturday 21nd of November (2009) the dark woods of Finland made room for the second *Nordic TD Forum.* 87 CG² industry professionals from the Nordic countries met for the annual occasion to learn, discuss and explore into the depths of fantastic imagery and seriously technical talks! We even had a few participants from outside the region. Which is an honest sign of *good news travel far*.

This year's program had been heavily inspired by the 2008 survey (enclosed in this evaluation). 2008 had been a great kick start for NTDF³, but the ambitions were to take the conference to the next level. Specifically to put more focus on hardcore technical stuff and actual pipeline designing, directly involving Open Source⁴ talks and taking that whole concept in mind.

We were happy to have our great moderator, John Carey, back for the 2009 conference. During both conferences John did a great job in keeping discussions alive and adding to any topic brought up. He constantly challenged the audience and the speakers, and inspired everyone at the conference. John Carey is one of the most experienced professionals in the CG industry worldwide. He has been in the industry from the very beginning and his experience and network is close to endless. The devotion and dedication shown by the Nordic participants at NTDF, the talent and strong ambition to break ground and create new things has connected us with John – and it is my sincere belief that having John on board it is of great value to us as association and professional network, but indeed also to the Nordic CG industry in general.

Apart from John Carey we had the pleasure of welcoming speakers from:

- Image Engine, Canada ("District 9" feature film Oscar nominee),
- Pixar, USA ("Partly Cloudy" short film Oscar nominee),
- Ghost, Denmark (Talk on Creature pipeline and other Open Source topics),
- Filmkameratene, Norway ("Max Manus" feature film)
- Storm Studios, Norway ("Max Manus feature film, "Skylappjenta" short film)
- Remedy Entertainment, Finland ("Alan Wake", Xbox 360 game)

This year's objectives were the following:

- 1. To have between 40-60 paying participants. A smaller amount than in 2008, but deliberately scaled down to accommodate to two important facts:
 - Location had changed from Copenhagen to Helsinki which we expected to cause some decrease in numbers of participants. People have to get use to the traveling of the event, but from 2008 Survey we knew our audience supported this idea.
 - In the program we intentionally targeted more heavy technical topics something we also expected would to have a slight impact on numbers of participants, making us able to hit more clearly *on target* so to speak.
- 2. To have participation from all 5 Nordic countries.

- 3. And to have an approximate split between Technical Directors, Art Directors/Directors and students as follow:
 - Technical Directors 80%,
 - Art Directors/Directors/Producers 10%,
 - Students 10%.
- 4. Last and indeed based on the survey results of 2008 we wanted to improve networking opportunities between the participants once the scheduled program was over for the day.

The actual 2009 conference numbers turned out like this:

- 49 paying participants
- Participation from all 5 Nordic countries + individual representatives from other European countries
- Great location with absolutely no internet connections which really brought people together and optimized the networking potential!
- The on-site sauna and direct access to icy sea water created the perfect Finnish environment for everyone to enjoy the event!
- Official start up of forum discussions (forum site officially opened at NTDF 2009 www.tdforum.eu)
- Title split among the participants as follows
 - Technical Directors 79%,
 - Art Directors/Directors/Producers 21%,
 - Students 0%

The 2009 talks were tailored to the audience and gave an excellent professional basis to the event and the networking. Something the 2008 Survey had specifically asked for and which we were happy to provide. The MPC ⁵speaker of last year, Jimmi Gravesen (Danish citizen, CV enclosed in evaluation report), has now relocated to Denmark and has been throwing a lot of energy and competences into lifting NTDF to the level of professionalism where we aim it to be.

With the experiences from 2008 our aim for the 2009 program was to get more technical talks. The 2009 participants were happy and encouraged to see how the technical level talks had been increased - and the general response from people attending has been "see you next year in Oslo".

The 2009 conference fulfilled the expectations of our target audience! Personally, it completely exceeded my expectations in terms of networking, good discussions and very interesting and relevant talks directly usable in our individual daily work - and I can't wait to start funding and planning the coming years events! The 2010 dates have already been settled – *November 19th and 20st in Oslo, Norway.*

Like the first year, we conducted survey of some 20 relevant questions. A couple of questions allowed for "free text" replies. The remaining questions had *yes/no/don't know* answers. 37 participants submitted their comments. Both survey results are included in this report as documentation.
